Administrative Hearings and Appeals

The final presentation will cover rights of Section 8 voucher holders who are facing termination of their subsidies. Topics will include statutory and regulatory authority for termination, grounds for termination, termination based on criminal activity, notice requirements, hearing requirements, and other procedural protections. We will also cover appeals of administrative decisions, a key tool to enforcing the rights of voucher families.
